NEW 5-YEAR SPIRITUAL PLAN GUIDES US TO SERVE AS LIVING LIGHTS... BEACONS OF LIGHT

One of the most beautiful aspects of the Catholic Church lies in its perpetual motion. Its liturgical calendar keeps the Body of Christ focused on Christian mystery, always presenting and re-presenting seasons, figures and feasts, helping us to grow in faith and love of Jesus. And with every passing cycle, progress urges gain in spiritual maturity.

The same can be said of uniquely sacred times in the Catholic Church, such as the recent Jubilee year. The "pilgrims of hope" theme offered a rich overlay of meaning to the faith journey.

It easily brings to mind the three wise men – *the magi* – who journeyed with great hope, following a star, that they might find the newborn King, the Messiah.

"Guide us to thy perfect light," as the song lyrics go. Their story evokes a prayerful plea from the heart of every Christian on Epiphany and beyond. *Lord, guide me, too! Help me to shine!*

From Jubilee to Glory!

On the Feast of the Epiphany, as Pope Leo XIV closes and seals the Holy Doors at St. Peter's Basilica for another 25 years, God's providence and perfect timing swirl about us. We stand in awe and sense our own "mini epiphanies" and spiritual inspirations.

The Jubilee Year and all its graces – *forgiveness, renewal and hope* – hold a special and illuminating message.

"...the Glory of the Lord has dawned upon you." That is, Christ's Light has dawned upon you. *"Then you shall see and be radiant, your heart shall throb and overflow."* (60:5)

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Stewards of light as they care for our parish and school campus

The sheer volume of people coming and going daily to Good Shepherd Catholic Church facilities and St. Elizabeth Ann Seton School (**SEAS**) puts the campus's holy traffic on par with the busiest of public centers. Hundreds of students, staff and teachers scurry through the gates of learning for daily academic nourishment and faith formation. Hundreds upon hundreds of adults come, too, for morning Mass, ministry and meetings. On any given weekend, several thousand faithful souls come through the doors to worship and serve.

Who ensures everything is clean, stocked, and welcoming? Who steps in to maintain these places and spaces when light bulbs burn out, something needs repair, or trash receptacles overflow?

Enter Sam Hamon and Shane Galvan, the school and parish's resident maintenance men with bright smiles, warm words and great attitudes.

"Overall, I enjoy it," Sam says of his maintenance work for SEAS. "I enjoy working with my hands and I like things being tidied up," the Elk Grove native assures, referring to his work as "super-fulfilling."

A few years ago, he saw the ad in the parish bulletin, applied and by "divine intervention," he secured the job. On-site early in the morning, Monday through Friday, Sam handles a range of tasks primarily for SEAS but with natural overlap in serving the entire Good Shepherd campus.

"I execute work to the best of my ability," Sam acknowledges, wise to the fact that every day is different, brimming with new challenges to fix, clean or repair. His pleasant, welcoming nature witnesses to Christ as he holds doors open with a smile and children parade into the narthex. Or when he sets out driveway cones to



manage after-school traffic flow, waving to parents and exuding calm control.

Shane focuses on church grounds and buildings and shares a "get it done" philosophy with Sam, which makes these two young men "house favorites" and surely saintly stewards of light as they tackle sometimes very unbecoming work.

"I like it, it's honest work," Shane affirms, also indicating that he can often be "thrown into things" (like assembling the new welcome center desk in the narthex) and on-call in the event of emergencies.

Shane attended St. Charles Parish in Livermore and first came to Elk Grove to work for The Grove Youth Ministry.

"My pastor there used to say I had been 'sent' to work here," Shane mentions, pointing to that turning point pillar of missionary discipleship – to SEND every disciple out to carry on the mission of Jesus. But after shifts occurred in the nature and structure of The Grove, Shane's job was eliminated. Out of work, he asked the parish business manager whether any other jobs were open, thus beginning his new role in maintenance.

Sam and Shane concur, working as colleagues amid maintenance demands makes their responsibilities more pleasant. Cleaning restrooms, stocking paper goods, and responding to occasionally impolite or impatient people can be taxing.

"There are people who are really kind, though, and that offsets any frustrations," Shane admits.

Sharing about the most appealing part of their work both refer to the quiet of the church. Late at night, closing down and turning off the lights, the setting "anchors" Shane.

"I like the candlelight. I see the tabernacle," Shane says.

"Same," Sam echoes, commenting on his early morning hours, opening up. "I really feel the presence," he adds, sensing Jesus dwelling in the church and in his heart. "I've really come to appreciate that time."

"I like to think of this work as 'support' work," Shane concludes, drawing a connection to how maintenance work is about "maintaining dignity." He describes how ministry workers, clergy and the faithful need the comfort of knowing facilities are clean and in order.

"Maybe it has been a long night of reconciliation, or an emotional spiritual experience," Shane imparts, signaling that the last thing someone wants would be unkempt facilities. "It's like when Jesus washed the feet of the apostles," he explains, drawing a parallel to Jesus' humility to clean the soles (and souls) of others.


"Every moment is an opportunity for learning and growth," Sam submits. 



Aspiring for Heaven

Diane & Matt Marcotte turn to several saints as they strive for heaven

Relating to a particular saint is often very personal and uniquely tied to an individual's story. For Diane and Matt Marcotte, the same holds true as they recognize that their journey as spouses means supporting the other in their holy devotions – *recognizing, listening and appreciating one another's saintly connections.*



Everyone in heaven is a saint," Diane says, echoing the Catechism of the Catholic Church (948) and pointing to our time on earth as a time when "*you are aspiring to get to heaven.*" This comes to her mind every time she hears the phrase, "we're all called to be saints."

The exact phrase also stirs Matt to consider saints as role models and protectors. "We turn to saints because they are an image of one guided by Jesus," Matt reflects.

Diane's role as the parish's communications and development coordinator explains her attraction to **St. Therese of Lisieux**.

"I think of her and her quote about doing small things with great love," Diane shares, hinting that life and work can be overwhelming, "but you can always do small things and make a difference."

Like St. Therese, Diane tries to remember "the little things" in everyday life...kind words, and small gestures like "sending a card, making a meal, listening" in times of need.

Still, growing up with solid familial ties to her Portuguese heritage, Diane reveres **Mary, the Mother of God**, as her source of strength and inspiration.

"We always prayed to Mary while I was growing up," Diane says of the long-standing practice that continues today.

"Now, let's help each other get to heaven,"

Matt rounds out his list with two more giants – **St. Francis of Assisi** and **St. Michael the Archangel**.

"Blessed McGivney illustrates well the Knight's

"St. Francis always was a big presence in my life," Matt recalls, reminiscing about his youth and the songs and prayers that point to this patron of the "environment" and advocate of peace. Matt refers to St. Francis' writings and the origin of the famous albeit transmuted quote, "preach the Gospel at all times, use words if necessary."

St. Joseph is another spiritual powerhouse to Matt.

St. Michael signals leadership for Matt, who simply states he "leads by example." St. Michael evokes powerful imagery as a protector against evil, guarding the Church and providing spiritual defense.

Matt lists several saints whose lives seem woven into his like golden fibers tying everything together. Employed by the national office of the Knights of Columbus as a governance risk and compliance specialist, Matt's natural inclination is to turn to **Blessed Father Michael McGivney**, founder and patron of the

approach to everything, and that is to put people first," Matt conveys, indicating it is an attitude he tries to imitate in his life, greatly influenced by his 21-year membership in the Knights and his "4th degree" status.

"He is a big figure to me because of who he is and what he represents," Matt shares, referring to his fatherhood to Jesus and his patronage as "Father of the universal church," but also his quiet strength, protection and humility as husband to Mary. With Diane's encouragement, Matt turned to the Novena to St. Joseph the Worker before landing his job with the Knights of Columbus.

Striving for heaven with this cadre of saints gives Diane and Matt what they need to step forward in faith every day, reminded to love and serve by the saints they hold dear. Married for nearly 25 years with two daughters, both "feel blessed" to work for Good Shepherd and the Knights of Columbus, respectively.

On the weekend of January 3/4, the Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord, all Masses and preaching will highlight this exciting time in our parish history.


Not just a new initiative, *Living Lights* asks everyone to consider how Christ shines within them.

The Spirituality of Missionary Discipleship

Good Shepherd Parish introduced missionary discipleship to its community early in 2021. Embedded in the words of the parish prayer, the congregation invites the Holy Spirit to "form our parish as missionary disciples." As intentional disciples, we pray that we may grow in our relationship with Jesus and share the gift of salvation with everyone we meet.

Origins

What preceded this need to inspire parishioners and communicate in a coordinated fashion? A spiritual plan. That is, a vision for Good Shepherd Parish as a vibrant faith community that takes seriously Jesus' words, "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you." (Matthew 28:19) The five-year plan considers the community, and points to spiritual areas for focus and growth.

What Influenced the formulation of a spiritual plan

 **Call to Holiness** – In April, 2021, Bishop Jaime Soto shared a pastoral letter titled, *Call to Holiness*. In this letter, he asked parishes throughout the Diocese to "revitalize" and embrace the disciplines of co-responsibility and accountability in their respective missions. Parish councils were to identify and reflect upon several topics as pathways to authentic holiness, so that "together with Christ we can be His living sacrament of joy and hope in Northern California."

 **Missionary Discipleship** – About the same time, Good Shepherd Catholic Parish became acquainted with the idea of missionary discipleship. Since the Spring of 2021, parishioners have prayed our parish prayer after communion, recognizing its emphasis on the Father's invitation "to share in the life and ministry" of Jesus. We pray that the Holy Spirit will "form our parish as a community of missionary disciples." Specifically, we petition God to lead us to "grow as an intentional community, committed to go and announce the Gospel of the Lord."

Many have memorized the words of this prayer, allowing it to resonate in their hearts and minds. Parishioners have also heard powerful homilies that explain and reinforce the concepts of missionary discipleship. Indeed, for over four years, we have read and listened, absorbing the theme and vocabulary, possibly noticing the terminology, and understanding how missionary discipleship unfolds in our own lives.

The extent to which missionary discipleship transforms parishioners' lives varies, of course. Imagine Good Shepherd Parish as a Catholic community where every member actively and intentionally lives out their faith. Think of the parish full of baptized Catholics dedicated to living and sharing the Gospel in all parts of their lives.

Good Shepherd, already an attractive and growing parish, would be a full-fledged community of missionary disciples, bringing more and more people to Jesus: *people who seek Him and need Him; people who believe but struggle with truly knowing, hearing and loving Jesus; people who may not grasp the magnitude of His gift of salvation; and people who do not yet believe, but someday will.*

Missionary discipleship isn't new. Good Shepherd's pastor,

Father Michael Vaughan, introduced it to the parish years ago, true. And, every Pope for the past 60 years preached the essence of missionary discipleship, professing its importance. The documents of Vatican II discuss it as do Papal letters and encyclicals. **It is who we are.**

 **Jesus** – But long before any of this, there was one man who spoke eloquently of this calling. In fact, "the world itself could not contain the books that would be written" (John 21:25) on all his teachings and works.

Jesus. Yes, Jesus himself calls us to this work of missionary discipleship as the Gospels attest. Jesus calls us to be missionary disciples who are nothing less than Living Lights, imitating Jesus, who says, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life." (John 8:12)

We are Living Lights, called upon by God to shine like stars.

New Living Lights Welcome Center

In recent weeks, a curious "reception" desk commands the east end of the narthex. As part of the parish commitment to usher Living Lights, the welcome "center" continues to take shape.

Here, parishioners will experience the new beginnings of the Greeter Ministry. Trained desk volunteers will staff the desk before and after Sunday Masses, equipped with a growing cache of information and resources.

The purpose of the welcome center aims to "help parishioners find their mission." All kinds of "tools" will evolve and unfold over time to give insight to parishioners seeking to receive and give the light of Christ. Additionally, all ministries will rotate volunteers to staff the desk, allowing opportunity for parishioners to delve into featured ministries and discern participation.

Momentum

The parish's spiritual vision reflects the power of the Holy Spirit, working in and among clergy, staff and parish leaders who have prayed, discerned and determined its content. Therefore, the parish plan likewise possesses the power of the Holy Spirit to instill within parishioners a deep sense of meaning and purpose as children of God, chosen and blessed. How we communicate, support and live the spiritual plan, in essence, is *cooperation and collaboration with the Holy Spirit – with God's grace*.

As missionary disciples, answer the call to holiness and mission and respond to what Jesus asks of each parishioner, personally, and the parish as a whole. Perpetuate the bright light of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior.

Luminosity

The plan echoes the overarching Christian mission to be Christ's light in the world. Objectives aim to highlight Good Shepherd's community function in that mission – that is, the parish is a "place" of growth and service. Here, parishioners can deepen their understanding of Christian purpose and meaning through the spiritual vision presented in the new parish plan.

- **Share** the vision for the parish as described within its 5-year plan
- **Instill** a sense that Good Shepherd is a vital and spirited Catholic faith community
- **Put** Jesus at the center of everything
- **Underscore** a zeal for souls and a mission to foster personal relationships with Jesus
- **Communicate** an open/welcoming campus that facilitates growth in virtue/holiness
- **Appeal to and activate** disciples for mission, both in ministry and apostleship
- **Reach** active and inactive parishioners within the defined parish boundaries as well as those who are yet to develop their faith and relationship with Jesus, those who have fallen away, those who are seeking and yearning to know Christ, and those who are unchurched and unaware of the Good News (cf. *Evangelii Gaudium*, 15).

Tickets for our **Harbor Lights Crab Feed 2026** will go on sale at weekend Masses early in January. (It often sells out quickly.)


Send—Be Jesus wherever you go. Our mission does not stop at the walls of the church.




